

## Grandmother's Bunny

Sometimes vintage can appear amazingly modern - it's hard to believe that I discovered this little bunny in a vintage sewing magazine from 1933 - hence her name: "Grandmother's Bunny!"


A great project for beginners or a quick easy make for the more experienced.



### You will need:


- 10” square piece of cotton or linen fabric
- 3” square scrap (approx) of floral fabric for bunny’s dress
- DMC stranded cotton floss in colours 704, 905, 838, 3790, 3810
- Bondaweb

### Stitch Guide



### Notes on working:

- Two strands of floss are used throughout.
- Transfer the pattern to the centre of your fabric using your preferred method. (If you’re unsure about transferring patterns, then you might find my “Simple Stitchery” free e-book useful. You can download it from my website [www.bustleandsew.com](http://www.bustleandsew.com))
- Trace the bunny’s dress onto the paper side of your Bondaweb using the *reverse* pattern. Cut out roughly, then fuse to the back of your floral fabric. Cut out dress, peel off paper backing and fuse to background fabric using your transferred pattern lines as a guide.
- Secure the applique dress with small straight stitches worked at right angles to the edge of the fabric in a suitably coloured floss.
- Work the rest of the design as indicated in the stitch guide below.
- My bunny is shown mounted in an 8” hoop.
