



# Shellfish Napkins

## Shellfish Napkins

#### Notes:

Stitch used is split stitch.

Each motif measures between 2½" and 1½" across

If you are unfamiliar with working any of the stitches, then I recommend you visit the Royal School of Needlework Stitch Wall where there are really clear full instructions, including video




### Materials

- Ready made napkins (or make your own by hemming a square of fabric of course). I used 100% cotton napkins from UK retailer Next as I loved the decorative borders. If you want to use these then the product code number is 587-577
- DMC stranded cotton floss in colour 350

### Method

Use two strands of floss throughout.

- Iron your napkins well before beginning.
- Stitch design in accordance with guide on following pages.
- When finished press lightly on the reverse.



#### Stitching Guide

This is a *very* simple stitching guide as all the motifs are stitched in the same way using a single colour of floss. The most important thing is to remember to secure your thread well when starting and finishing and keep the back nice and neat as it will be seen. I chose split stitch as I think it's a very hard wearing stitch and these items are likely to be frequently washed.

Use two strands of floss and work the split stitch in the direction of the red arrows in the diagram above.

I have seen similar napkins available online that are quite expensive - my cotton napkins cost just £14 for a set of 4 approximately 15" square and adding the motifs does, I think, turn them into something special.





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Pattern is full size and reversed to suit your preferred method of transfer.
