OVE TO SEW AND SEW WITH LOVE

As we enter the summer exa season I remember how n daughter Rosie was always ve nervous beforehand and worrie about disappointing results. But a I used to say to her - I shall never k disappointed as long as you hav done your best - cos you can't c better than your best. I think th holds true for all of life - not ju exams, so I thought you might lil this simple cross stitch design. It stitched on a thrifted vintage do (these are really easy to find) ar then mounted on some very mode fabric for a nice contrast.

Finished project shown mounted (an A3 artist's canvas block.

Materials

- 15" x 20" non-stretchy background fabric
 I used Grid in Pink from the Nordic Design Studio (available from M is for Make in the UK)
- Thrifted cotton doily the centre of mine measured 5 ½" across if yours is a different size then you may wish to resize the pattern.
- Stranded cotton floss in colour of your choice - I used a dark greeny-blue

- White thread
- A3 or near equivalent size artist's canvas block
- Staple gun.
- Temporary fabric marker pen

Simple Cross Stitch Design

DO

Method

- Launder and press your thrifted doily.
- Transfer the cross stitch pattern to the centre. The template is actual size and one black square represents one cross stitch. Alternatively you could use waste canvas if you prefer. Work the cross stitch design using two strands of floss.
- Remove any transfer lines. Place face down on a clean flat surface and press again. You may like to use a towel beneath your work when pressing to avoid flattening the stitches.
- Press your background fabric and place face up on a clean flat surface.
- Place your canvas block in the centre and draw around it with a temporary fabric marker pen. This will help you position your doily.

- Pin or spray baste the doily in place with the top approximately 1 ½" down from your temporary fabric marker pen. Stitch to the background fabric with white thread using small stitches that won't show.
- Press your work again.
- Place face down on a clean flat surface, then position your canvas block on top so your design is centred.
- Turn the excess fabric to the back and staple in place working from the centre of each side outwards. Pull the fabric fairly taut, but be careful not to stretch and distort it. Mitre the corners and trim away excess fabric. Neaten the back - it's a nice idea to cover the raw edges with washi tape if you have any.
- Remove temporary fabric marker pen lines.
- FINISHED!!



Simple Cross Stitch Design

Either transfer the pattern and work as you would a printed cross stitch design or work on 14 count waste canvas.
